2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process : 2.2.4 Teacher Quality :	 Principal takes the lead in preparing the academic calendar and teaching plans are made along with the involvement of HODs' well in advance and are followed. Special lectures, seminars, study tours enriches the teaching learning process. Formal feedback from students and stake holders is obtained. ICT enabled and traditional chalk and talk method followed. Mechanism exists for organizing teaching- learning evaluation. Role of IQAC in teaching-learning process visible. Out of 52 teachers 22 hold Ph.D, 10 are M.Phil and 16 hold NET/SET, 04 hold PG degree as highest qualification and 32 CHB faculty. 06 faculty members are on BOS. Average pass-percentage of the college is higher than that of the University result. Conduct short term courses, cultural activities, discussions, seminars, snap tests and guest lectures enhanced the employability of the students.

2.3.1 Promotion of Research:	 Research Committee exists. 14 Minor Research Projects completed and 04 in progress. Faculty members are engaged in Inspire Scholarship holder research guidance. 12 faculty are very much active in supervising 32 research candidates. 	
2.3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research :	 The major funding are from UGC, DST, BARC, MoEF, SERB, CSIR and other Funding Agencies. Special funds for research by UGC under BSR scheme. The college has made a separate budgetary provision to promote the research. Special research grants are provided under Vice Chancellor Research Motivation Scheme (VCRMS). 	
2.3.3 Research Facilities :	 Well equipped laboratories for research activities. UGC 'Inspire scholarship' for research for students. Provision to provide seed money to the faculty for their research by the management. 	
2.3.4 Research Publications and Awards :	 Faculty members have published 476 research papers in peer reviewed journals. (Citation index = 1266 and gross h-index = 42). 244 Books with ISBN are published. The college publishes an annual 	

	 magazine "Chetana", received award by the affiliated university. Research Project is compulsory in final P.G. Departments adopt research writing on eminent personalities of the country.
2.3.5 Consultancy:	 Soil testing consultancy provided to local farmers. Revenue generated through consultancy is Rs.10,000/- last year. Informal consultancy provided in local area. Consultancy need to be extended with the neighbouring industries & other organisations.
2.3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility:	 The students and staff very actively participate in all extension activities like Awareness on AIDS, Voter Awareness, Save Girl Childs campaign, celebration of all important days, peace rallies, blood donation, traffic awareness programme, tree plantation and Medical Camps. The N.S.S. students adopted one village every year and conducted special camps for the last five years. N.S.S. units received best unit award by the affiliating university. 95 N.C.C. cadets have been qualified with "B" & 60 cadets with "C" certificate respectively. The college N.S.S./N.C.C. unit has good relationships with institution/ organizations of the locality on extension activities.
2.3.7 Collaborations:	 Department of Microbiology has undertaken collaborative research with NCCS, Pune. Potential for collaboration with local industry and business exists. Scope to have collaborations with rural and non-governmental organisations.

Open access system provided for PG students and research scholars. Library is Multi storied building and having advisory committee.

There are 174 computers & 09 Laptops having LAN with internet and Wi-Fi facilities, Printers-26, Scanners-15, 10 LCDs and 04 OHPs. The library, administration and sections are having IT facility. Smart Classes are yet to be established.

2.4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities:	 The entire campus is Eco-friendly and is well maintained. Power backup facility is available and is plastic free campus. Smart card technology for security, Multi channel digital services are visible. Services are outsourced for general maintenance. The labs (15) are very well maintained.
